Dear Friends of the Parish of White Waltham,

As I write *(Editor's note: this piece was written in mid-March)* 'coronavirus' is spreading: what state will our country and healthcare be in by the time you are reading this? It has already revealed some serious challenges to us as individuals as well as community.

Selfishness...

Some businesses are banning flights, and rotating key workers into and out of isolation to reduce risk of infection and keep operational. Others have had flu symptoms and been quarantined until testing clears them. Others I know of, have learnt that they have been somewhere, or been with someone, that poses a risk and have self-isolated for a while. But we all may need to take steps that inconvenience ourselves to help others. Will we do it? In China, the authoritative system means the populace are used to acting for the common good. In the West we are much more individualistic: 'I have my rights!' Will we obey recommendations and act selflessly on behalf of each other? The stockpiling of items which says, 'I need to have this, so you can't have it' doesn't bode well. Will selfishness win the day and increase the problem?

Fear of Death ...

The panic that seems to bubble under the surface, can go beyond fear of inconvenience, to fear of the threat of death itself. Whilst not being as fatal as some diseases, coronavirus' ability to spread increases its overall impact and some, including those particularly at risk, fear death from it.

In the prophetic words of the Old Testament and in Jacus' teaching we

prophetic words of the Old Testament and in Jesus' teaching, we are offered instruction for enabling this to occur. The writings of Paul and others reiterate the same message. In his letter to the churches in Galatia, Paul emphasises that the fruit of the Holy Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, and self-control. He concludes with the words 'Let us keep in step with



the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other'.

...but I don't believe in god...

Some people say to me they don't believe in god, and many people live like that. This page is for you. Because I want to ask:

'What god do you not believe in?'

Often when someone describes the picture of god which they don't believe in, it is often a god that I don't believe in either!

...a god who is a killjoy

You may imagine God as a dictator opposed to fun or pleasure, or as a grimacing judge with a gavel, readily pointing out faults and stifling any sense of joy we have. We might see God as a cosmic killjoy.

And if we think of a 'sin' as just having that extra piece of cake, or not exercising today, or whatever other minor temptation we may want, I can understand how we build that picture.

But that sad picture of a cold, disagreeable sourpuss is not the God of the Bible. He takes pleasure in things, he delights in us, he created us to experience a range of pleasures through our senses. Think of your responses to seeing a wonderful view, smelling that scent, hearing a laugh or piece of music, or the joy a married couple can have in each other. Pleasure was God's idea; He is anything but a killjoy

The Trinity God of the Christian faith is the source of true joy.

Jesus declared "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full". And we see this in His attractive life and teaching and miracles, for example the excess of high quality wine produced at that wedding in Cana. In fact Jesus was criticised by the establishment for having too much joy and not obeying social conventions. No wonder as Joy is listed as a key fruit of the Holy Spirit in your life.

Our problems come when we turn from the Father God who gives Joy to His children, to other things. This is the heart of 'sin' and spoils our lives. As we get to know Him we realise God doesn't act to squash pleasure, but rather to save us from our pleasure-less-ness. C.S.Lewis wrote: "It would seem that Our Lord finds our desires not too strong, but too weak. We are halfhearted creatures, fooling about with drink and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us, like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea. We are far too easily pleased."

In fact, through Jesus, God offers to restores us from our broken, bored selves and give us the true joy we were made for, in Him and each other, forever.

What holds you back?

However hard the international fire fighters worked in Australia, it seemed that the fires always had the upper hand. But in the end, God sent the solution and so many centres in Australia's eastern states were reeling from extreme flooding events but at least almost all the fires were extinguished.

We keep having a few much smaller fires here in New Zealand and many parts of our country are suffering from a real lack of water. Reservoirs are running dry and many small streams have dried up. Fields are bare and the sheep and cows have little to eat. I believe that God will send us a similar answer and that soon these areas will have ample rain to remedy the situations.

The sad thing is that people receive blessings from God but fail to recognise him, let alone give him thanks.

I know too that many of the readers of this Parish Magazine have heard lots of times about God's free offers. He wants to forgive your sins. He wants you to have eternal life. He wants you to be his child for ever. So just what does hold you back from accepting these amazing gifts from him?

People give amazing excuses or reasons why they will not say "Yes" to God. They say "I'll wait 'til I'm older" or "I don't believe in God" or "I can't be bothered or "What will my friends say if I become a Christian?" or even "I live a good life; God will certainly take that into account". And so very sadly, it is a decision that they either block out entirely or deliberately refuse to even consider.

So again I ask, What is holding you back? Do you even know how to become a Christian? Let me try to make it plain:

- 1. Admit your need (I am a sinner)
- 2. Be willing to turn away from your sin *(repent)*
- 3. Believe that Jesus Christ died for you on the cross
- 4. Pray and invite Jesus to come into your heart and life *(receive Him as your Saviour and Lord)*

I did this many years ago and I can tell you that I have absolutely no regrets. When my life ends I know where I shall be, and that is with Him for eternity. Don't you want that too?

Here's a prayer you could use:

"Dear Heavenly Father, I know I am a sinner and need your forgiveness. I believe that Jesus died for my sin. I am willing to turn from sin. I now ask Jesus to come into my heart and life as my personal Saviour. I am willing, by God's grace, to follow and obey Christ as the Lord of my heart and life."

I'll end with the title: "What is holding you back?" Now I hope nothing holds you back.

POSTPONE or CANCEL

These two words seem to have cropped up quite a bit recently about decisionmaking, especially for big events. Of course, postpone means to delay or put off something that is meant to happen soon, until a later date. But cancel means to blot out or remove something so that it does not happen at all.

In the devastating flooding in the British Isles, residents would have wished to cancel the stormy downpours altogether, but even postponing them might have given them some more time to enable greater preparations to be made. Sadly, hundreds of people have been affected, some in life-changing ways. Our thoughts are with them. But we can't control or postpone our weather.

Then we have the coronavirus. We would so dearly love to control that problem, or preferably to cancel it completely. As I write, it is spreading threateningly around the world, sadly taking lives as it goes and causing so much disruption. Once again it is a devastating situation that we can only try to prevent getting any worse, both for nations and individuals.

For both catastrophes, there are a few things we *can* do. Most of all we can take advice from those who are experts in medicine, transport, communication, human resources, tourism and sport to name a few. We may end up postponing that family wedding, that birthday party, that holiday, that trip to London or going to that sporting event - to try and avoid mixing with groups or crowds of people where there may be a risk to us or to other more vulnerable people. In some cases, for all sorts of reasons, an event might have to be cancelled.

There was a situation where Jesus would have liked a cancellation or, maybe, a postponement. He was in the Garden of Gethsemane, just before Good Friday and he prayed to God his Father to take away 'this cup' of imminent suffering, which was his fast approaching death on the cross. He prayed the same prayer three times (*see Matthew chapter 26 verses 36-45*) but in his heart he also knew a cancellation of his impending death would have been a failure for him and for the whole of mankind.

In fact, Jesus' death on that first Good Friday and rising again on Easter Day was the biggest cancellation in the whole of history! It was not the cancellation of an event, it was Jesus, as Man-God being willing to die for us and so cancel out all our wrong doings for ever, if we seek his forgiveness and put our trust in him.



So don't postpone your important decision! This Easter-time, read all about the death and resurrection of Jesus for yourself in one of the gospels and find the full meaning of having all your wrong doings cancelled by trusting Jesus. Happy Easter!

NEW CHURCHYARD REGULATIONS

The Diocese of Oxford has introduced new churchyard regulations which require us to remove items which have not been properly authorised.

In particular, the following items are not allowed: any lighting, whether electric or otherwise; any glass shades; kerbs, fencing, railings or other demarcation; stone or glass chippings; individual gardens, including the planting of shrubs; plastic flowers and wreaths (other than poppies of remembrance); toys or other objects which are not part of a properly authorised memorial.

We displayed notices asking people to help us to adhere to these new regulations by removing these items. Any items which were not removed from the Cremation Area were carefully stored so they could be collected by arrangement. It is now nearly two years since the notices were first displayed and, with limited storage space, it has been decided that these remaining items can no longer be kept. Please get in touch as soon as possible if there is something you would like to keep.

Tales from the Bells

f White Waltham Bell Ringing



We have been fortunate to have visiting learners from two different towers to White Waltham. One Friday we had enough to ring all 6 bells.

Several minor jobs have been done in the bell tower. For example, the 'stay' on the treble was making a noise - this was due to it catching the 'runner board' as it was pulled into the 'up' position. A very small amount was shaved off the side of the stay and the noise has now gone. A loose hook for the 'spider' (not a real spider but one to pull the bell ropes out of the way) was made good, most of the boxes that shorter people use to stand on have been topped with carpet and some other small jobs have been done. Most importantly though, a new bulb was



purchased and fitted for the emergency light which had gone out. The emergency light is a very important safety feature in a bell tower: should there be a power cut during evening practices we could be plunged into darkness. This would be a very dangerous situation – those who are less experienced may not know where their rope is and other ringers would not be able to see to step in and help. In these circumstances an emergency light enables us to stop ringing safely.

There are more bells being rung on a Friday than for a Sunday service, where there is only 3 of us. It would be fantastic if we could have all the bells ringing for Sunday services once things return to normal.

We would like to ring out the bells on the 75th anniversary celebrations of VE Day; commemorating the end of the Second World War and remembering those who paid the price by losing their life for our freedom.

In this article, we normally write and let you know what is going on in the council. However, the main concern at the moment *(mid-March)* is the Coronavirus. The council is planning ahead and, following the Budget announced recently by the government, will work with the government.

As your local Borough Councillors, our concern is not only with planning ahead for the Borough but also for our residents; particularly, at this time, those who are older, more vulnerable, unwell or unable to get supplies due to the panic buying we are all aware of.

We do ask you to help those vulnerable residents who are your neighbours in whatever way you can and if there are any problems, do please contact us. We are all just waiting to see how this situation progresses, but during these times it's good to look out for each other.

Now, News from the Council...

The winter period has ended and spring is upon us. The Council are starting a new cycle which puts in place the ability to deliver a financially responsible budget for 2020. Many may know that all local authorities are facing a difficult period with a forecasted overspend. With this budget we will deliver a transformative, innovative & financially responsible budget that



will future-proof RBWM and ensure we always support our most vulnerable residents whilst planning for the future in light of the climate change.

We are a low Council Tax authority and will be in the future, but one which firmly adopts the principle of the user pays, so our tax payers do not have to subsidise non-core council services for those who can afford it. There will be an increase of 3.99% of Council Tax which includes 2% for the adult social care precept, which is an overall increase of 79.5p per week.

We are continuing to invest in supporting our most vulnerable residents and addressing broader policy such as climate resilience, which is now driving our response in areas such as parking.



Community Wardens

You may also be aware the council will be reducing by 6 the number of Community Wardens. In order to mitigate any potential impacts and ensure wardens have the ability to meet ongoing need, a smarter working pattern for wardens is being implemented. This will see the wardens move away from ad-hoc patrols within a Ward towards a more targeted patrol pattern that is much more dependent on risk and informed by local intelligence. Wardens will be engaging with stakeholders including resident groups and elected members.

Climate Emergency

Given the importance of this issue, the council has recruited two new positions with responsibility for developing the strategy. The officers and cross-party members will look to develop:

- A strategy to achieve carbon neutrality
- Cutting subsidies for polluting vehicles & encouraging sustainable alternative transport.
- Increasing recycling rates.
- Making better use of innovative digital technologies.

Change can be difficult but if we are serious about reducing our carbon footprint it is absolutely necessary.

WITH EVERY GIFT, WE STOP THIS CLIMATE CRISIS

Our planet is changing, but some people are feeling the effects of this more than others. Due to the climate crisis, droughts are now more frequent and more intense, and one place that has experienced this is Kenya.

In Kitui, eastern Kenya, 8 out of 10 people depend on rain to grow crops. Without water, staple crops like maize and beans wither up and die. People can't grow food, which means they can't earn a living, and go hungry.

Drought forces people to walk further and further to collect water. This daily burden robs them of the chance to farm and grow food for their families. Elderly women and children are especially vulnerable on these dangerous and exhausting journeys.

Strength and power - Florence's Story

What happens when the search for water does not consume people's lives? We can find out by meeting Florence: a woman who has transformed her life with access to a dam full of water.

A few years ago, Florence's husband died, leaving her a widow. At that time, she had no water to grow crops. She had to walk for hours to collect water. 'Life was miserable,' she told us.

Florence could easily have been defeated. But things changed when Christian Aid's local faith-based partner, Anglican Development Services – Eastern (ADSE), worked with her community to build a dam, just 30 minutes from Florence's house. Using water from the dam, Florence

grows tomatoes, onions and chillies on her farm. Her children can eat healthy, nutritious vegetables, and she has enough left to sell. Florence also uses the dam to keep honey bees: the microclimate of plants created by the dam means the bees don't need to search long distances for nectar. She sells the rich, golden honey at the market.



Smiling brightly, she says: 'I have been sustained by the earth dam. My life has changed. I am very happy. You can see it in my face: my face is shining. I have strength and power.'

Florence is a generous woman of faith. She knows others are struggling to cope with the drought, and hopes they will experience the same blessings she has received: 'I am thankful to people who have donated to build this earth dam. I am praying God will increase their giving.'
