News from your Borough Councillors

The good news – shops are now open, but don't forget to wear your mask. Apart from that, many people are still working from home and the council is no exception.

The Town Hall is only accessible to a very limited number of staff who must be there for operational reasons (or who cannot, for whatever reason, easily work from home) but not to the public nor to us councillors. Virtual meetings continue and these can be viewed on YouTube. Risk plans and good governance plans for a potential second wave and associated localised lockdowns have been drawn up by the council ready for implementation. Our key focus remains on keeping residents safe and trying to support the local economy as best we can.

As promised, we will shortly be returning to a weekly collection service for food, black bin waste and recycling, alongside the fortnightly garden waste collections. After a discussion with our waste contractors, Serco, we

have agreed that this change will start on 17th August. However, as part of that, and in the light of increased costs due to the significant extra volumes of waste we are now collecting, a number of routes and collection days may have to change to ensure that the service operates at peak efficiency. Any changes will be communicated to you with as much notice as possible.

A key part of our work has been to encourage people back to our shops, pubs and other amenities in order to support local businesses and traders. However, we have also been reminding residents that face coverings are now mandatory in shops and supermarkets.

- Under the new rules, people who do not wear a face covering could face a fine of up to £100.
- Children under 11 and those with certain disabilities will be exempt.
- Should an individual without an exemption refuse to wear a face covering, a shop can refuse them entry and can call the police.

Environment and climate strategy consultation – update

In June 2019, we declared an environment and climate emergency and we made a commitment to achieve a target of net zero carbon emissions in the Borough by 2050, in line with government policy.

The past twelve months have allowed us to develop an environment and climate strategy. The strategy sets out a framework for the delivery of a net zero carbon borough by 2050, along with an action plan covering the next five years. The draft environment and climate strategy, which has been created by members, officers and the community, was approved to go out to public consultation at Full Council in June 2020. This consultation runs from Wednesday 29 July until Tuesday 29 September 2020, when we will ask residents for their feedback on the strategy and specifically whether we are focusing on the things that are important to them.

Our Parks and Open Spaces

We have been reminding residents that if they visit one of our many parks or open spaces, they should use the bins for their litter, or if the bins are full, they should take their litter home with them.

New posters have been created which will be displayed in some of our parks and open spaces, particularly where there are known to be problems with littering.

Our parks and countryside team make every effort to ensure that the bins in the parks are emptied regularly, but

Last time I wrote about the Covid-19 virus so this time, apart from one brief comment, I shall not use the same topic. I have a relative in the UK who caught the virus and an in-law who sadly died as a result. But as I look at what has happened here in New Zealand and what is still very sadly happening around the world, I am so grateful for the actions taken here.

But it has been quite a sad week for our family here. As I write, I can look up to a lovely photo hanging on the wall. It is of a long haired black and white cat called Teak. His story is very special to us and we think back to the days when my wife used to help out at a local pet shop. One day, the owner had had some kittens brought in; they were not caged but kept behind a wall of cardboard. As we turned to leave, this wee kitten climbed over the wall and

then right up my trouser leg and into my arms. I stroked him and then placed him back behind the wall as we turned to leave the shop.

But he had not finished with me; he again got over the wall and in no time was back in my arms. So you guessed it – we took him home and he quickly became part of our family.



He was a real gentleman and had no aggression

towards our other pets nor to people. He was definitely "my cat". But just before the virus, we took him to the vet with a growth on his nose which we already realised was cancer but the vet could operate. A previous cat of ours had been treated successfully a few years ago. However, by the time the restrictions were over, the tumour had grown so as to be inoperable.

We kept on loving him, making sure he was not in distress or pain until this week when we knew the time had come to let him go.

I took him on Tuesday and our vet very lovingly administered the anaesthetic and laid him, as he went to sleep, in my arms. The final medication was then given and I sat and cried with him as his life ebbed away.

Liz and I have shed so many tears and even getting his ashes back will do little to lessen our loss.

We grieve for our pets; we grieve even more for our friends and family but the Bible tells us that there are two kinds of grieving – the first relates to those whom we know are in heaven because they trusted in Jesus while they lived – we shall see them again in heaven as the Bible tells us. For these we grieve but we have a sure hope. But for those who pass away having never accepted Jesus as their Saviour, these cause us deep grief because we shall not see them in heaven. If you love the Lord, make sure these friends and family know it and are challenged to accept Jesus for themselves.
