

Dear Friends of the Parish of White Waltham and Woodlands Park,

"Boy from home done good!" "Girl from the neighbourhood succeeds!" We all get a bit proud if someone we know or are associated with does well – achieves fame or glory – whether it be a family member, colleague or friend.

In Luke 4 we have recorded the 'homecoming' of Jesus. He comes back to Nazareth, having achieved some fame throughout Galilee as a wise and powerful teacher. Can you imagine the buzz? "What will he say and do?"

Jesus has a scroll of Isaiah opened, and reads these words:

'The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.'

Then, into the expectant hush he says *"Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing."* Wow, good news, the season of the Lord's favour, but who is this for? Maybe Jesus was speaking to you?

Who are these poor?

The poor are **prisoners** – do you ever feel trapped by situations, habits, attitudes? Maybe it is money and greed or jealousy, sensuality and the chase of the next experience for fulfilment, or a destructive relationship or habit.

Maybe Jesus was speaking to you.

The poor are **blind** – in the bible, light is associated with truth and good; darkness is ignorance and deceit. Do you feel the need for wisdom, for truth and a better understanding of who you are and what you are for?

Maybe Jesus was speaking to you.

The poor are **oppressed/crushed** – do you feel a guilt or unworthiness, or that feeling of almost being suffocated by problems so that you cannot summon the strength and direction to escape?

Maybe Jesus was speaking to you.

But we need to understand that the 'poor' are humble. They are ready to receive help, admit their lack and failings, not self-reliant nor self-righteous.

We have been thinking about that in our church family. We pray that when you visit with us you will find us repentant, humble and so offering a loving welcome to you. Because we all need to receive God's love in Jesus, none of us is more worthy or deserving than any other, even (and especially) the vicar! And the good news for the poor that Jesus came to proclaim, is that we can indeed receive the help we need freely, not because of who we are or what we do, but through who God is and what God has done.

Good news for the poor indeed!

If you feel you don't know much about who the historical Jesus is, and what he said and did, we would love it if you came along on a Sunday morning to find out more. Or do join our course this autumn as we look at the short book of Mark, explore what this good news is, and share our questions and doubts. More details on page 9.

You don't need to know anything about the Bible. You won't be asked to pray or sing or read aloud. You can ask any question you want, or just listen.



On Saturday 24th June, Housing Solutions coordinated a 'Summer Fayre' in Woodlands Park. Maybe you were there?



Find your way through the maze!

White Waltham CE Academy



It has been a jam-packed summer term with lots of exciting learning and experiences for all the children at White Waltham. Below are just some of the highlights for a brilliant end to the school year.

Foundation have been very busy this term! First with their topic about hats, where the children learnt all about different types of hats and their uses, including: hats to keep us safe; hats for special occasions and hats of faith. The children loved setting up and running their own hat shops in the role play area, as well as designing and making their own hats. The children were able to show off their creations during their own Mad Hatter's tea party, which was a lot of fun!

For the second half of the summer term, Foundation have been learning all about plants and growing with their extraordinary garden topic, where they have had the chance to learn about the different parts of a plant. They have set up their own garden centre in the role play area to buy and sell different seeds and plants. They children planted some of their own plants, including a tomato plant, and watched as the tomatoes developed and ripened.

Foundation also had two school visits this term. Firstly, they were able to go on their visit to Waltham Farm, where they learnt all about the animals at the farm and how to take care of them. Foundation also visited Windsor Great Park's environmental centre to learn about woodland plants and wildlife.



Year 1 and 2 have really enjoyed their topic 'Our Wonderful World'. In this environmental themed topic, they have learnt about the famous broadcaster and natural historian Sir David Attenborough. They learnt that he has visited countries all around the world to explore the animals and plants that live there. The children then located Madagascar on the world map. They investigated the climate in Africa and how animals are adapted to live there. The children then did some fieldwork on the school grounds to see what living things can be found there and discovered an array of minibeasts! The children completed observational drawings of the insects



and created collages of them inspired by the work of Eric Carle (author of the Very Hungry Caterpillar).

To enhance the learning throughout this topic, Year 1 and 2 visited Beale Park to learn about the animals they look after that come from Africa and how they are suited to their natural habitat. Year 3 and 4 have been learning about kings and queens with their topic 'Marvellous Monarchs'. They looked back to almost 1000 years ago in 1066, when William the Conqueror became king after the battle of Hastings. They learnt about how the role of a king is very different today to how it was in William's reign and learned about how key events, such as the signing of the Magna Carta, resulted in monarchy having less power. In Geography, the children learnt about the United Kingdom. Learning the names of the four countries and their capital cities as well as landmarks and climate differences between each area of the UK.

For the second half of the summer term, the children have been thinking about how to take care of our environment. They gathered recyclable materials and used these to make eco-friendly musical instruments. To enrich this learning, the children were joined by Fred from 'The Beat Goes On' to learn about how to use household items as well as body percussion to make different rhythms.

Year 5 and 6 have been very inspired by their topic 'Global Warming'. They began the topic by learning about the causes and effects of climate change. They used maps and data to explore parts of the world which are most impacted and why. In Design Technology, the children learnt about flooding in Bangladesh due to the changing climate. They then designed and made a sustainable floating garden prototype to solve the problem of growing crops in flooded areas. The children learnt about King Charles III and his keen interest in the environment and ways to protect it, including the Terra Carta - an agreement by businesses to move towards a more sustainable future. As part of this topic, the children visited Epping Forest to take part in a workshop by the Field Studies Council.



We finished the year with a fantastic production of Matilda. The children really enjoyed learning the famous story written by Roald Dahl and learnt lots of new skills putting on the performance. We were hampered by the rain during our rehearsals, which meant the final performance went

ahead without being able to practise it fully beforehand. The children all did a superb job of learning lines, songs and dances.

The children were able to support in the creation of props and set design for the production too. The whole experience was a wonderful finale to our 2022-23 academic year and the year 6's did a brilliant job of leading the production. Hopefully, it will be a special memory for them to have of the end of their primary days.



Could you help with online Language Lessons for Refugees?

In April of last year, I saw a plea for people to help with online English language classes – no need for any previous experience or qualifications, just be willing and available on Zoom for an hour and a half each week in term time. I had been looking for a manageable way in which I could support those arriving from Ukraine in particular, so I expressed an interest in helping and duly signed up!

After a quick training session via Zoom, I saw a class at a time and day of the week that suited me and found myself helping in a group led by an experienced teacher, along with a number of other 'tutors' like me. We are emailed some details before each session so we know what topic we are doing (e.g. 'eating out') and during the session we each take a small group of 3 or 4 people to chat through some pre-prepared questions/areas for discussion - perhaps using photos, video or audio to prompt our conversation. I have really enjoyed being able to engage with the students through the classes and making a difference, albeit in a very small way.

Classes are <u>very</u> over-subscribed (300+ people on the waiting list!) with numbers of helpers being the limiting factor. *So if you could help, please email Bridget on waltham.vicar@btinternet.com.* I'll try to answer your questions and can provide details of who to contact to find out more.



Restoration of the Chapel Room

Just over a year ago, a few bits of lime plaster were found on the floor in the Chapel Room. An inspection was made and we quickly realised that a restoration project was needed.

We applied to the Diocese to get a repair underway quickly, but this always takes time. We had wanted to use modern materials (to save on cost and labour) but these suggestions were rejected so we agreed to restore the lime plaster onto the original laths, plus a lime-wash paint as a full restoration project. The estimated cost was $\pounds 20,000$ which we raised from trusts, very generous local people and our own congregation. We thank God for these very kind donations and are very grateful to all those who have been supporting this project.

The work involved removing loose plaster, cutting out the many cracks back to the laths and fitting 24 metres of mesh between the rafters to provide a solid base for the new lime plaster. There were three layers of lime plaster, as originally built, and then three coats of lime-wash paint to finish off the decoration. The rest of the Chapel Room was then carefully painted in lime-wash to match everything up.

Our world is full of damaged situations and things falling apart. There are plenty of cracks that need to be repaired. There are pieces that need to be renewed – replaced with better, stronger leadership and decision making. Our world needs to have a whole new foundation (like the plaster with its strong mesh fixings) and a new coat of paint to freshen everything up.

As for you and me, we too are flawed and have broken pieces in our lives – cracks that need major restoration. The Bible reminds us that Jesus came:

- to mend the broken
- to sort out the weak cracks in our lives
- to restore us to what we should be like

It is only when we accept his inspection report of our situation and recognise that we need an expert to restore us back to full health and usefulness, that he can properly help us.

The Bible calls all these failures in our human structure 'sin' and Jesus is the only saviour in the world who can deal with all of our sin because:

- he died on the cross for you and me and overcame all sin and evil
- he rose again from the dead, demonstrating his power to save by defeating death.

So come to church, have a look in the Chapel Room and remind yourself of how the restoration in there reminds us of the restoration that Jesus offers each one of us.

Bob was thrilled to bits when he received his certificate, which is now displayed in pride of place at his home. Congratulations and thank you Bob for your continued support and contribution to ringing.


WHY? It's the annual Ride & Stride event!

Biodiversity lending library

There is specialist equipment you can borrow to find out more about the biodiversity in your garden or nearby environment. To conserve nature, we need to know what is around us, and how it is changing. You could see if bats are ducking and diving in the skies above your garden by borrowing a device that can pick up their chirps and clicks that are too high a frequency for us to hear. There are also thermal monocles and cameras to discover what shy creatures come out after dark, and the grassland nets to investigate the biodiversity clinging onto the long stalks. Simple identification guides are also available to borrow.

The lending library is managed by our team at Braywick Nature Centre. The equipment is free to borrow for you to complete your own biodiversity surveys, which can be uploaded on our website. If you'd like to borrow something, please contact the library as below. We hope you enjoy finding out more about the wildlife in your local area.




