The last time we wrote was at the beginning of the Coronavirus outbreak and we would like to thank our residents for all the help they have given to our vulnerable residents either personally or through the village groups. We would also like to thank residents for their patience and co-operation as we have had to re-jig council services to reflect the crisis, including waste collection and disposal. As you know, the 'tip' at Stafferton Way has been re-opened following the green light from government and Thames Valley Police. For our residents, the day to visit 'the tip' is Tuesday. At present the bin collections will remain the same.

The site will be open from 8am – 8pm, to give residents the chance to dispose of waste that cannot be safely stored at home Please only make a trip if you are unable to store your additional waste at home. The health of residents and staff is always the highest priority, so everyone visiting the reopened sites will be expected to observe the new social distancing measures that have been put in place.



Place your Advantage Card and driving licence or another proof of address and photo ID on your dashboard for crews to see.

You should only visit the tip once on any Tuesday. In the event that the queues are too large, the site may have to close temporarily to deal with the demand. Only cars are currently permitted at the site; no vans or trailers are allowed.

Things to remember when visiting the Stafferton Way site:

- You should only visit the site if you cannot safely store your waste at home.
- Both sites will be open.
- You will need to observe the social distancing measures in place.
- Staff are unable to help you move waste from your vehicle.
- We will accept garden waste, wood, cardboard, bulky items & black household waste.
- White goods (washing machine, refrigerator, etc.), plasterboard, clothes and paint will not be accepted at this time as disposal routes for these are still currently closed.
- Only cars will be allowed on the site.

In line with Public Health England guidance, residents who are vulnerable, or who are showing symptoms which may indicate coronavirus, should not visit household recycling centres.

Now, following government guidance, we are emerging from 'lockdown'. During 'lockdown' the council were extremely busy, especially in our duties to 'shield' vulnerable residents and look after our children in care, as well as working closely with our NHS colleagues to continue to provide key services across adult social care.



Just a few specific things - we ensured any homeless or rough sleeping people were housed. Food parcels were delivered by volunteers and volunteer groups and will continue to be delivered. Small/Medium Business Grants were paid to companies. Roads continued to be resurfaced and potholes repaired.

The council's organisation is now moving back to full working capacity, but as you can imagine the finances have been seriously impacted - as with most councils. (continued)

At time of writing, we hear there have been 112 Covid-19 specific deaths in our Borough which is very sad news.

Schools are being re-opened, albeit with limits to the class size and only for certain age groups at present. Our officers have been working with each school making a bespoke plan to follow government guidance for the safe return of children to school.

In the meantime, the Lead Member for Children's Services on the council has contacted the Secretary of State for Education to seek support to urgently share the scientific evidence behind the recent guidance relating to the reopening of schools for the younger years of primary education.

We do recognise and support the need to get children back into school as soon as we are safely able but we understand the view expressed by many in the teaching profession who cannot reconcile the public health guidance relating to Covid-19 with the guidance to plan to open the younger years of primary education with far lower levels of infection control. We have asked the government, as a matter of urgency, to share that evidence so the teachers and parents can be reassured that what we are asking of the sector is safe and proportionate for all involved.

NEW LIFE

As some of you know, I regularly run around local roads and countryside so I've noticed a big change in traffic recently as there are far fewer cars commuting or taking children to school. But there are more dog-walkers, joggers, cyclists and families out strolling the area. So exercise is up – great news! And pollution is down – great news too!



As a result of Covid 19, we have all become much more friendly as we travel past each other with loads of good mornings or brief chats, at a safe distance. That positive result is also because we are not stuck in our car bubbles, where we only talk with the occupants. So in the future, we could use our feet or our bikes much more to maintain that restored way of interacting. That's part of what the Government is hoping to encourage us to continue, when life is back to normal.



All of us will have experienced social distancing queues in supermarkets and other places, as part of our new shutdown situation. As I write there has been a limit on who we can meet and where we can arrange to see friends or family.

It made me think about how life was managed in Jesus time when there was virtually no transport, just the odd donkey or maybe cart, or perhaps boat, and everyone expected to travel on foot – sometimes for hundreds of miles! There was probably no social distancing in Jesus time when there were clearly health problems, though lepers had to remain 'outside' the town limits unless the priest checked that they were clean once more. I wonder if other diseases or viruses might have also been around in addition.

There were a number of recorded examples where large crowds came together. On one occasion such an enormous throng gathered outside the house where Jesus was staying, that four friends had to climb onto the roof and break open a hole to let down their sick friend on a bed, for Jesus to heal.

Another of Jesus' miracles involved 5000 men being fed with bread and fish and that did not include the women and children! There were very large crowds cheering Jesus on when he came as King riding on a donkey on Palm Sunday. No social distancing required then!



But maybe the largest crowd of supporters and opponents would have gathered on Good Friday, along the route that Jesus staggered, or at the cross where he was crucified. In spite of all these gatherings we don't read of large-scale illnesses or diseases being around, but mainly individuals with some form of sickness or physical problem.

But of course we are all sick. We're sick spiritually. We have that disease called sin which is the way we fail to keep God's laws. That's what Good

Friday is about. Jesus died on our behalf to bear the penalty for our sin which meant he had to die for us. But though he died, he broke the power of sin and death by rising again on that first Easter Day as the Bible explains. He proved that his power over evil and over death was unquestionable and unique.


A short story from the Bible

The Philistine and Israelite armies faced each other. For 40 days, the gigantic Philistine champion, Goliath, taunted them.












